Greater Worcester Land Trust

The <u>Greater Worcester Land Trust</u> recently completed the 67 acre Asnebumskit Briarcliff Entrance conservation project in Paxton. This gift of land by the Gillian & Fleming families was made possible through a partnership with the <u>White Oak Land Conservation Society</u>. This property adds to the previously protected 99 acre Asnebumskit Ridge and connects to a 30-acre property owned by the Paxton Conservation Commission. A 187 acre conservation area has thus been protected! #OurMassLandTrusts

Young Land Professionals Event at Arcadia Wildlife Sanctuary

Wednesday, October 28, 2 pm - noon

Join the Young Land Professionals for an afternoon of tree planting in Northampton, MA for floodplain restoration with a discussion following the work. We will be helping to restore 13 acres of floodplain forest in the meadows managed by Mass Audubon at Arcadia Wildlife Sanctuary. Floodplain forests are uncommon in Massachusetts and host rare plants, store stormwater during flood events, and provide important wildlife habitat. Come restore a landscape and learn about land management and restoration practices while networking with other land professionals. Register here.

Policy

Protecting Farmland from Solar Development

On September 17, 2020 the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources (DOER) released its <u>SMART Agricultural Solar Tariff Generation Units Straw Proposal</u>, which proposes greatly expanding the use of farmland for solar development. In part, the expansion relies on the premise that certain agricultural activities could continue under elevated solar panels. While the idea of such "dual use" is laudable, actual data on the sustainability of agricultural activities under solar panels is limited at this time. While MLTC supports the state's efforts to expand renewable energy to address climate change, we are preparing written comments to encourage a cautious approach to siting solar installations on farmland. Changing of the Guard at Mount Grace After an incredibly successful 26-year tenure as the Executive Director of Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust, Leigh Youngblood retired October 1. Emma George Ellsworth has stepped into the position after a year of having worked with Leigh as Deputy Director. Leigh will stay on for one year in an advisory capacity to ensure a smooth transition. Leigh built Mount Grace from



a small 1-person organization into one of the strongest and most dynamic land trusts in Massachusetts, with 35,000 acres conserved in less than 35 years and a staff of 9 people. Four Land Trusts Inaugurate "Give Back to the Land" Day

Franklin Land Trust, Hilltown Land Trust, Kestrel Land Trust and Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust collaborated to create a 24-hour online giving day on April 22, 2020 to encourage contributions to land protection efforts in their region in honor of Earth Day. More than 325 donors participated, contributing a total of \$39,572. Of those, 190 donors chose to make an additional gift to support organizations working to address food insecurity – an option that was added in consideration of the pandemic. As a result, \$4,795 in donations was forwarded to the Food Bank of Western Massachusetts and Quabbin Harvest.
