



Historic Hanover Field Permanently Preserved

Sylvester Field in Hanover was recently purchased and protected via a collaboration between Wildlands Trust and the Town of Hanover. Encompassing a small pine grove and 660-feet of frontage on Third Herring Brook in Hanover's Four Corners neighborhood, Sylvester Field's highly-visible 10-acre meadow and stone wall bordering Washington Street is a cherished part of the town landscape. It has both historical and ecological value, and has long served as an agricultural, recreational and aesthetic resource for the community. Most recently known to many locals as Robinson Field, the last property owner was Clayton Robinson, who died in March 2020. Debbie Lincoln, his cousin, was an important advocate among family members for preserving the scenic open field and the continued public use of its frequently-visited walking trails. Under Wildlands Trust's ownership, Sylvester Field will be maintained in its current state. The field-edge walking trails

will remain and annual mowing of the field itself will continue. Read more.

15th Edition of the Natural Heritage Atlas Now Available

Produced by the Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP), the Atlas represents the known geographic extent of habitat for rare plants and animals protected under the Massachusetts Endangered Species Act (MESA) and the Wetlands Protection Act (WPA). These maps are used primarily to determine whether a proposed project or activity must be reviewed by NHESP for compliance with the MESA and the WPA. Access the maps and learn more.

Land Trust Wins State Dam Removal Funds

Of the 28 grantees receiving over \$17 million in funding from the EEA's 2021 Dam and Seawall Grant program, all but one are municipalities. Wildlands Trust was awarded \$729,000 to remove the Sylvia Place Pond dam in Kingston. The dam is in poor condition and has outlived its usefulness; breaching it will restore fish passage, improve public safety, and relieve a management concern for the land trust. One of a series of interconnected impoundments originally constructed to supply power to nearby mills, Sylvia Place Pond is nearly surrounded by Wildlands Trust's 27-acre Stewart-Person Preserve. Grants

MassWildlife Habitat Management Grants

Application deadline: Friday, August 27, 5:00 p.m.

Habitat management grants between \$10-50k are available to private and municipal owners of conserved lands to enhance habitat and improve outdoor recreation opportunities, with all work to be completed by 2022. The project area must be within Priority Habitat. Grants can be used to: 1) Improve habitat(s) for game species. 2) Manage habitat(s) for Species of Greatest Conservation Need as identified in the Massachusetts State Wildlife Action Plan with special emphasis on State-Endangered and State-Threatened Species. 3) Promote public recreational opportunities for hunting, fishing, trapping, and other wildlife associated recreation on conserved lands. Merrimack Conservation Partnership: Two Grants

Application deadline: Wednesday, September 15, 5:00 p.m.

- <u>Land Conservation Grant Program</u> underwrites transaction costs—appraisals, surveys, title research, staff time, etc.—on conservation transactions that protect land identified as a priority in the 2014 Merrimack Valley Regional Conservation Plan.
- Environmental Science, Education and Outreach Grant Program provides funding for environmental science, education and outreach activities related directly to the Merrimack River or its watershed. Funds can be used for activities such as youth or public environmental educational activities, development of outreach and educational materials, river clean ups, water quality testing and monitoring activities, and other related activities.

Quabbin-to-Cardigan Partnership (Q2C) Land Conservation Grant Program

Application deadline: Wednesday, September 15, 5:00 p.m.

Eligible towns: see list

The Q2C Land Conservation Grant Program underwrites transaction costs—appraisals, surveys, title

research, staff time, etc.—on conservation transactions that protect land identified in the Q2C conservation plan. Non-profit land trusts, municipalities, and state agencies that have land conservation as a primary function are eligible to apply. Learn more.

Salt Water Fishing Enhancement Grant

Application deadline: Friday, October 15. Grant opens September 1.

The Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries is offering a grant of up to \$15,000 to coastal communities in Massachusetts to promote or enhance salt water fishing access. Eligible applicants include municipalities and NGOs, including land trusts and similar organizations (Buzzards Bay Coalition and Marshfield Tennis at Peter Igo Park have been awardees). Funded projects have included canoe and kayak launches, boat ramp lighting, fillet stations, surveying of public ways to water, and landscape architects. The project area must have equitable access to all individuals, and be located where salt water fishing can take place. This is a reimbursement grant and all projects must be completed by the end of the fiscal year. Email ross.kessler@mass.gov for an application and supporting documentation.

Community Forest and Open Space Conservation Program Grants

Application deadline: Monday, January 10, 2022

The U.S. Forest Service invites local governments, qualified nonprofit organizations, and Indian tribes to apply for grants to establish community forests through fee simple acquisition of private forest land. The purpose of the program is to establish community forests by protecting forest land from conversion to non-forest uses, and provide community benefits such as sustainable forest management; environmental benefits including clean air, water, and wildlife habitat; benefits from forest-based educational programs; benefits from serving as models of effective forest stewardship; and recreational benefits secured with public access.
