2,100 Acres Conserved After Decades-Long Effort Lynn Woods, which stretches through Lynn, Saugus and Lynnfield, has been protected via a Conservation Restriction (CR), the result of a partnership between Massachusetts Department of Conservation & Recreation (DCR), the City of Lynn, and Greenbelt, Essex County's Land Trust.

The CR, granted to DCR and Greenbelt, ensures the property – including three drinking water reservoirs – will be forever protected against development threat, and will always be available for public enjoyment of its 40+ miles of woodland trails. Lynn Woods' significance as a watershed and place of quiet enjoyment was already recognized in the late 1800s, when it was one of the first – and for a time the largest – municipal parks in the country. For example, in

advised the City of Lynn that the site should be left undeveloped and preserved in its natural state for local residents to enjoy. Now, 135 years later, this vision will be upheld for future generations. As Kate Bowditch, Executive Director of Greenbelt notes: "In addition to all the benefits of its trails and water supplies, Lynn Woods is nature's air conditioner for the neighborhoods of Lynn...and its permanent protection will mean those benefits will be there for future generations, who may need Lynn Woods even more than we do now".
